Before the British conquest of New Netherlands in 1664, only two Dutch ships delivered full slave cargoes to the port of New Amsterdam. Most enslaved Africans arrived in small groups on cargo ships from the Caribbean. This pattern continued into the 18th century as New York City, under British control, remained a relatively minor slave trading port.
