1931	8,020,000	15.9%
1932	12,080,000	23.6%
1933	12,830,000	24.9%

# **President Hoover Describes the Role of Government**

- A) "The American system is founded upon the conception that only through ordered liberty, freedom and equal opprotunity to the individual will his initiative and enterprise spur on the march of progress."
- B) "The Republican Party restored the government to its position as an umpire instead of a player in the economic game."
- C) For these reasons the American people have gone forward in progress while the rest of the world halted."

### Franklin D. Roosevelt Supports Active Government

- A) "I shall ask the Congress for the one remaining instrument to meet the crisis -- broad executive power to wage a war against the enemy -- as great as the power that would be given me if we were in fact invaded by a foreign foe."
- B) "The country needs and demands bold experimentation. It is common sense to take a method and try it. If it fails admit it firmly and try another. But above all try something."
