



Robert Minor, Morgan, Mellon, and Rockefeller (c. 1922)

James N. Rosenberg, Days of Wrath, 1929






- 1. Morgan, Mellon, and Rockefeller are wealthy industrialists. How are they shown by the artist?
- 2. How does the drawing of "Oct 29" help us experience the start of the Great Depression?




- How are these art works showing the Brooklyn Bridge similar and different?

Diego Rivera, Frozen Assets (1931)




- What does the top section of this wall mural show?

This wall mural shows many scenes from the 1930s. Select one of the images. Write a story about the people in the scene.




- What story is being told in each of these pictures?
